Mayor's Message

Hello and welcome to the newsletter.

Firstly, I would like to thank the Litchfield community who voted in our new Council at the election in August. The last two months have been full of introductions and getting our heads around Council's plans and policies. We are all very committed to our community and looking forward to future planning for Litchfield.

We have had some big works projects taking place over the last few months with more to come in the months ahead. The Mango Strategic Roads project is getting closer to being finalised with three of the four roads complete. Kentish Road works have commenced, and it is anticipated that these will be finalised mid-2022.

Virginia Road is now complete with a new reseal on a section of the pavement that was failing. The road was closed for a period of approximately three weeks which allowed the works to be completed quickly and efficiently.

The Federally funded Black Spot project on Power Road is continuing, with completion expected early December 2021, weather permitting. The widening of the floodway will provide a safer drive for commuters and residents on this road.

Building plans are underway for the new multi-purpose community building to be erected on the Council office land at 7 Bees Creek, Freds Pass. This building will provide a meeting, events, conference, and activities space, available to community organisations, businesses, and individuals, as well as being the new Council Chambers. The multipurpose community building is expected to be complete mid-2022.

There are some great Council activities in the new year, our annual Australia Day Event. This is a free, fun day packed full of exciting things for the whole family, including free bacon and egg breakfast, cooked by the Rotary Club of Litchfield/Palmerston, jumping castles, face painting, fun run and of course the awarding of the 2022 Citizen of the Year, Young Citizen of the Year and Community Event of the Year. Of course we will have our famous Australia shaped lamington constructed by the Lions Club of Litchfield.

Be sure to pencil this into your diary. Then there is the Litchfield Art Exhibition 2022. We are calling for nominations now for artists. The Exhibition is held on the first weekend in March, and it is a great way of showcasing our talented, local artists. Check out the website for details on how to enter the Exhibition.

As this is the last newsletter of the year, I would like to wish you all a very safe and Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. I look forward to keeping in touch in the new year and reporting on many more projects that we are working on as part of this year's Municipal Plan.

Going Green Rebate

Litchfield Council has identified a great new initiative to reduce waste to landfill through a 'going green' rebate program. This project aims to provide a reusable cloth nappy and sanitary items rebate scheme to reduce landfill.

3.75 million disposable nappies are used each day in Australia and New Zealand.

Disposable nappies take up to 150 years to break down in landfill.

Cloth nappies and reusable sanitary products are environmentally friendly alternatives; washed in full loads and dried on the line can help minimize water and energy costs.

Litchfield Council is pioneering the Going Green Rebate for cloth nappies and sanitary items, in the Northern Territory.

Residents living in Litchfield can apply for either or both of the rebates available up to \$150.

Terms and conditions apply.

Reducing waste to landfill is high on Council's agenda with a number of programs in place to incentivize the community to recycle. One program is the successful cash for container scheme where all funds are distributed through a grant program benefiting the community.

The Going Green Rebate is an incentive that is beneficial to individual residents as well as providing great benefits environmentally.

This rebate program will end when the funds are fully spent, currently there are funds of \$2400 remaining.

Dog De-Sexing Vouchers

Council is offering de-sexing vouchers to provide residents with financial assistance to de-sex their dogs.

If you are a resident of the Litchfield Municipality and your dog is currently microchipped and registered, you can apply now for a \$100 voucher off the cost of your dogs de-sexing.

De-sexing your dog is important and can provide many benefits such as:

- De-sexed dogs may be much less likely to escape from your property, become lost or fight with other dogs
- Various forms of antisocial and nuisance dog behaviour may be eliminated
- De-sexing stops the 'heat' cycles in females
- Your dog may become more content and settled, and less likely to display anxious or aggressive behaviour
- By de-sexing your dog you may reduce the risk of cancer or other diseases of its reproductive organs
- The community is not burdened with the cost of dealing with dumped litters of puppies and unwanted dogs



Did you know, 80% of dogs that are lost or wandering which are picked up by Council Rangers are NOT de-sexed?

If they are lost and wandering and not de-sexed they could be unknowingly contributing to unwanted litters of puppies. For more details, eligibility or to fill out an application form, visit Council's website www.litchfield.nt.gov.au


A multi-purpose standalone community building fully funded by the Australian Governments Local Roads and Community Infrastructure program is under development.

The community building will be built on Council land at the existing office location, 7 Bees Creek Road, Freds Pass. It will be separate from the Council administration building and designed to be available for community use within and after business hours. This means community groups, organisations, businesses, and individuals will have an indoor, airconditioned venue available that will be suitable for a variety of different purposes.

Council will also utilise the building for meetings, events, ceremonies, and activities.

Council is currently working through the design and tender documents in preparation of the next stage of the project.

It is anticipated that construction of the multi-purpose community building commences early 2022 with completion due June 2022.

Works Updates

Whitewood Road Footpath Renewal Stage Three

Whitewood Road Footpath Renewal was a commitment from Council in 2019 to conduct the renewal works in three stages over three years. Stage three of the project will see this project completed.

The \$180,000 final stage of renewal works to the Whitewood Road footpath includes works to resurface from Stow Road to Kundook Place. Works are expected to be completed by end of January 2022.



Phase One of Council Reseal Program for 2021-2022

The \$760,000 Council Reseal Program include the following roads or sections of:

Wheewall Road Bees Creek Road Carabao Road Elizabeth Valley Road Farrar Road Lapwing Road Therese Road
Zill Road
Mcgrelis Roads

Works are expected to commence in November 2021 and be completed late December 2021 weather permitting. Phase two of the program will commence after the wet season in late April 2022.

Mira Square

Council has received a \$300,000 Federal funding grant for the construction of a new Community Hall and facilities at Southport.

Works are expected to be complete by the end of March 2022.

The Community Hall will consist of a large open undercover area and a closed area, including kitchen facility.

Thank you to the Federally funded Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Grant.



Road Safety Upgrades

Council's Municipal Plan 2021-22 has committed \$50,000 to road safety which will see audits of all roads adjacent to schools in the municipality.

These audits will be used to inform any required safety upgrades and future major upgrades to improve safety around schools.

All audits are expected to be completed by the of February 2022.

Streetlighting

A Council wide streetlight audit will be undertaken as well as investigations into improving intersection lighting to various major intersections within the municipality.

A prioritisation of these upgrades will be formed as part of the investigation to inform future years capital programs and funding applications.







2022 Litchfield Art Exhibition

Entries are now open, and we are calling for local artists to submit pieces for the 2022 Litchfield Council Art Exhibition to be held in March 2022 at Council's Howard Park Recreation Reserve.

The Art Exhibition has been a great success over the past three years, and it just continues to grow and showcase even more artwork from our talented local artists.

The 2022 theme is 'elements' and with such diverse elements in the Litchfield region, the 2022 Art Exhibition is sure to produce some beautiful pieces.


